The project is to educate the public about the provisions of the Disability Discrimination Act outlawing discrimination in the provision of goods and services on grounds of disability.

This leaflet aims to provide an overview for the awareness raising and legal education aspect of the Project.

The Disability Rights Project, through the 14 regionally based Disability Rights Workers, aims to raise awareness about the goods and services provisions of the Disability Discrimination Act and provide an advice and casework service for clients.



The focus for the legal education work is to reach socially excluded groups. We aim to reach these groups through talks, seminars, and presentations to community and voluntary groups and advice agencies.

Through this awareness raising work, we aim to improve understanding of disability discrimination work in order to encourage better take up of rights by disabled people.
